

Akuapem Community Foundation (Akuapem CF)

Akuapem Traditional Area contains about 225,000 people in a defined geographic area (2000 Census). The Akuapem CF serves the area within the Akuapem Traditional Area and beyond. The Traditional Area currently spans two local government districts, namely Akuapem North and South District and Municipal Assemblies with their head offices at Akropong and Nsawam respectively.

The Akuapem Community Foundation evolved out of the Akuapem Forum formed in October 2001. The idea of turning the Forum into a Community Foundation began when the Lead Coordinator met **Dr. Juraj Mesik** of the World Bank at a conference in November 2003. When Dr. Mesik introduced the community foundation concept, it appeared the right fit. Akuapem Community Foundation is a community foundation in Ghana, which serves the Akuapem Traditional Area in the Eastern Region of Ghana and Beyond. The CF was incorporated on 14th April, 2005 with an initial membership of seventeen (17) public spirited individuals of Akuapem descent cutting across the North and South District boundaries, as well as language/ ethnic barriers. These individuals have set out to give Time, Talent and Treasure to help their community.

The main goal of Akuapem CF is to marshal resources to build an endowment fund, for Grantmaking, execution of own programmes, and to cover operational cost. The CF also aims to offer Leadership and Co-ordination of efforts where these are lacking.

The CF aims to promote and complement but not take over the areas of operation of any existing agencies or charitable organizations that are making efforts to meet the educational, youth, gender, health, cultural, environmental, civic, historic, moral and public needs of the Akuapem Traditional Area and beyond.

Akuapem CF has been engaged in youth development since its establishment in 2005 through its Akuapem Education Day Programme with the theme, '**Beyond BECE, there's 2nd Cycle**'. The Akuapem Education Day Programme was instituted in 2005 for the 2nd Tuesday in November each year for all Junior High Schools in Akuapem. The Day concentrated on looking for solutions to the problems that have been militating against the delivery of quality education in the traditional area such that for many years many basic schools score 0% pass at the BECE.

The Day as listed below is also used to highlight our thematic areas, through lectures, etc. still with the major theme 'Beyond BECE, there's 2nd Cycle'.

The Best Pupil Awards Scheme involves a donation of a set of English, Maths and Science Dictionaries to 3 Pupils each of the 150 junior High Schools in Akuapem and four other school districts beyond Akuapem namely:-

Dangbe East (Ada Foah R/C JHS),
 Birim Central (Asuboa D/A JHS),
 Kwabeng (Kwabeng L/A JHS),
 Suhum Kraboa Coaltar (Kofi Pare L/A JHS & Kraboa Coaltar L/A JHS).

Alongside the programme we instituted the Best Pupil Awards scheme through which we have distributed over 6000 books to about 2000 students (by the end of 2010) from all Junior High Schools in Akuapem, North and South Districts. Thus as laid out in our strategic plan, we created a Youth Bank who can readily be engaged in Youth Civic Engagement Programmes and Skills Training going forward.

Improved Teacher Accommodation - Through the solicitation by the Akuapem CF, Blue Skies Limited is building an improved model of teacher's accommodation at Yaw Duodu near Aburi Amanfo.

The **Getfund** has also agreed to construct two sets of teachers' accommodation and two sets of primary schools blocks in the two districts of Akuapem based on the information we disseminate from year to year on needs of the educational sector in Akuapem.

Our thematic areas have been:

- Improving the quality of formal education
- Building bridges across areas of misunderstanding – since every JHS in Akuapem is covered and even beyond
- Offering youth counselling on drug abuse and teenage pregnancy and attendant risks of HIV/AIDS.
- Involving the localities in the management of the environment to economically empower them.
- Upholding the Akuapem Heritage through sensitizing all groups in Akuapem, male and female to take up their responsibility towards bringing up their children to be respectful, an age old hallmark of the Akuapem people.

In the coming years Akuapem Community Foundation aims to project its grants, information gathering and advocacy and youth civic engagement programmes, to the end with attached please find the document we publish and update after each meeting to inform stakeholders about the situation in the Junior High Schools we deal with.

As a matter of record, we want to emphasize the following:

We have had support of **Okuapehene, Oseadeayo Addo Dankwa III** in special ways.....

- i. He chaired the launch of our Endowment Fund, courtesy Merchant Bank (Ghana) Limited and exhorted all to support the CF since he had absolute faith in our good intentions.
- ii. He wrote to the then Minister of Education, **Hon Osafo Maafo** about the problems of Education in the Akuapem Traditional Area out of which we have the opportunity to convene these fairly large stakeholders meetings on a school day.

We have also had support from the **Okuapehema, Nana Dokua I** who agreed to lend her name to our activities by becoming our life patron.

The political office holders in the Districts and one Regional Minister in particular, **Hon. Ofose Ampofo** have helped in highlighting the CF

We have also held meetings and had associations with all the major palaces in Akuapem. For example we have held some of the meetings of the Akuapem Forum which is the forerunner of the Akuapem CF at PPAG Centre of Abiriw, plus we have also presented books to schools in Larteh, which were not part of the special schools. i.e. the zero pass schools.

We need however to single out the chief of Mamfe-Akuapem, the Kyidomhene and acting Benkumhene of Akuapem, **Nana Ansah Sasraku III and Nana Saforo Okoampa III** - Apiredehene for praise, for taking time off to chair a durbar in honour of the Akuapem CF's programmes in their respective towns – Nananom , may the Good Lord richly bless you both.

Grantmaking – In 2009 and 2010, Akuapem CF launched and administered its first and second round of grants with support of funds from the Global Fund for Community Foundations. The grant amount ranges from **\$230.00** to **\$1,200.00**. Beneficiaries of both rounds of grants include farmer groups, amputees, medical school students and NGOs overseeing youth groups. A school management team in a remote village was awarded a generator, computer and printer to support Information Technology teaching in their school and also offer lighting for after school learning.

To conclude, we put on record our appreciation of all our associates for their collaboration and tolerance. We thank our major donors and sponsors namely, **Global Fund for Community Foundations (GFCF), African Women Development Fund (AWDF), Merchant Bank, HFC Bank, Ecobank, Bank of Ghana, Ghana Commercial Bank, Adwinsa Publications, EPP Books, Unimax Macmillan, Readwide Books, Eximguaranty Co. Limited, Mayan Books, Blue Skies Limited, UT, the Executive Secretary of the Narcotics Control Board and all Others.**

HFC Bank has been helping us with the purchase of the dictionaries we donate and we in turn embossed all the books with their logo. They also finance the printing of the counselling manual: The Illegal Drug Factor – An Impediment. We appreciate their dedicated support.

Indeed we were able to send library books to all the seventeen or so Senior High Schools in Akuapem, North and South, courtesy **Adwinsa, Unimax Macmillan, EPP Books and Mayan Books.**

We thank also the stakeholders – the Teachers, Students, Circuit Supervisors, Directors of Education etc. and especially **Odikro Yaw Safo of Yaw Duodu** for offering land to build Teachers Accommodation in his area.

We are at the end of existing 5 year strategic plan. We believe that we have created the necessary awareness in our community about the challenges we face to lift education to a level which will give it the prominence required as a key heritage of the Akuapem people and beyond.

Looking ahead we shall continue with the convenings, and certainly continue to give the awards which have been adopted by the HFC Bank who commit money each year for the books.

Best Pupils Awards Scheme – Positive Results

We need to highlight the positive results.

In 2008, JHS 3 students (Boys and Girls Prefects) benefitted from the book package.

This batch of beneficiaries of the Akuapem Community Foundation package wrote their BECE in April 2009.

Out of the 120 beneficiaries:

- 113 had grades between 1-6 in English i.e. 94%
- 104 had grades between 1-6 in Mathematics i.e. 86.6%
- 108 had grades between 1-6 in General Science i.e. 90%

For 2010, we need to read excerpts from what the Directors of Education had in their reports:

SPEECH BY THE MUNICIPAL DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION – AKUAPEM SOUTH

Madam Chairperson, Hon. Eastern Regional Minister, Municipal and District Chief Executives of Akuapem South and North, Members of Parliament, President and Vice President of Akuapem Community Foundation, The Clergy, Distinguished Invited Guests, Friends from THE Media, Teachers, Parents and Pupils, Ladies and Gentlemen.

It is my pleasant duty to present a report on activities that had taken place since last year's Awards Day Celebration at Ahyiresu Naturalist Centre.

With the inception of the Akuapem Community Foundation in 2005 and the launching of the Endowment Fund in 2006, some improvement had taken place in the quality of Education in the Municipality.

Since 2006, 3 brilliant students from public educational institutions have been given educational materials in a bid to arrest the fallen standard of education.

From the Second Annual Education Day Celebration to date, new books are being given to students in all Public JHS's in the Municipality and Private Schools came on board during the 4th Education Day Celebration.

These books are made up of mathematics, science and oxford mini dictionaries distributed to 3 best pupils on primary six who entered JHS.

The Akuapem Community Foundation had made great strides not only in the field of improving upon quality education but also the lives of Teachers and Students.

Form 3 pupils who were prefects from all JHS in both public and private schools received counseling on Drug Abuse and Teenage Pregnancy. 124 Teachers and other participants from the Municipal Education Office were also sensitized on how to identify and relate to young people who

abuse drugs and other substances.

There has also been an increase in the number of Junior High Schools in the Municipality from 54 to 59.

With physical structures, a proposed Teachers Quarters for (Yaw Duodu) Aburi Amanfo JHS is under way to be constructed courtesy Blue Skies Company Limited a fruit processing company at Nsawam through the solicitation of the Akuapem CF.

The second batch of beneficiaries of these donated books wrote the BECE in April 2010. Out of 210 beneficiaries,

- 203 had grades between 1-6 in English representing 96.6%
- 194 had grades between 1-6 in Mathematics representing 92.3%
- 198 had grades between 1-6 in Science representing 94.2%
- 103 had grades between 1-6 in Social Studies representing 49%

The Breakdown is as follows:

About 190 of the 2008 beneficiaries would be place in Senior High School this year which represent 90.4%.

This is a sign showing what Akuapem Community Foundation had contributed so far in yielding this positive result.

Madam Chairperson, during the 2010 BECE, 1935 registered, which was made up of 1042 boys and 892 girls but 1920, 1037 boys and 883 girls took part in the exams.

The number of candidate passed was 1386 being 745 boys and 641 girls representing 72.2% and the 28.8% was the failure which was also made up of 292 boys and 242 girls. The results show an improvement over that of last year's of 65.7% although students getting grade 1 in the individual subject reduced.

Madam Chairperson, upon all efforts we again had 2 special schools, zero schools, but this time, the schools are Obosono L/A JHS, and Duayeden L/A JHS. These schools could not produce candidates who had total aggregate less than 30. But I am happy to inform you that, during the 2010 BECE National Ratings, Akuapem South Municipality placed 19th out of 147 districts which took part in the exams.

This shows a remarkable improvement when compared to that of last year when we placed 37th. (Ghana Times, 1st Nov.2010)

Madam Chairperson, 1124 out of 1935 students who took part in BECE this year in the Municipality have been placed into Senior High Schools across the country but some parents are finding it very difficult to put them into their chosen schools. I am once again appealing to them to be aware that Beyond BECE, there is 2nd Cycle.

We are very grateful to Akuapem Community Foundation for their efforts and support they have given to us over these years. Truly these books supplied are making great impact on the lives of these little ones in the Akuapem Traditional Area. And we know when the Teachers Quarters are completed, it will give teachers the needed comfort to work harder and also be regular and punctual at school.

Really, they are giving back the 3T's, TIME, TALENTS AND TREASURE. In support of their efforts we also promise to work hard and improve upon education in Akuapem South Municipality.

SPEECH BY THE DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION – AKUAPEM NORTH

Mr. Chairman, the Eastern Regional Minister, Honourable MP's Akropong and Okere, Honourable DCE's Akuapem North and South, the Clergy, District Directors of Education, Executive Members of Akuapem Community Foundation, Akuapem North and South, Nananom, Heads of Basic and Second Cycle Institutions, Teachers, SMCs, Parents, Students, Ladies and Gentlemen.

I have the singular honour as the District Director of Education of Akuapem North to be part of this unique gathering and more particularly this being the first time since I assumed office.

I am told, this is the 6th time, platform is being given for stakeholders in education to meet, review and fashion out a way forward in respect of BECE results/

I will therefore congratulate the Akuapem Community Foundation for its vision for the children of Akuapem North and South.

I say Ayekoo!!!

Mr. Chairman, the wisdom in and appropriateness of the theme for this year's occasion cannot be over-emphasized. This is because; a sound mind can only be a product of a healthy body- a situation that engenders good academic work. I will therefore appeal to parents in particular to attach much importance to the health needs of their children. And the best way to do it is to help prevent diseases and sicknesses that are preventable.

Mr. Chairman, it will be an understatement to say that, good education is a large extent is a panacea for a country's under-development. Better still, any country whose human resource is under-developed spells doom for such countries. That is why, Mr. Chairman, what Akuapem Community Foundation ha done so far is must be highly commended.

It behoves every well meaning Akuapem citizen to see this programme as theirs so as to do anything possible to sustain and improve upon it.

The sag aspect of it however is that, the efforts of Akuapem Community Foundation notwithstanding, performance in the BECE results keep on breaking our hearts. Players always shift blame on others. For me, this smacks of subterfuge at its best- an attitude that would not make the situation any better. The time has come for us as stakeholders in education to accept our shortcomings, confront them headlong and resolve to change them. If everybody's blame is to be accepted, who then would be the cause for this abysmal performance?

Mr. Chairman, I am with deep sorrow and shame to mention that, Akuapem North District has once again recorded five zero percent schools in this year's BECE. Mr. Chairman, I will leave the presentation of the analysed BECE results to the officer in charge of examination after my address. If we are to dissect the true attributable reasons for such a performance, players who are outspoken would blame everybody except themselves. But as a District Director of Education who takes charge of formal teaching and learning, I cannot help but to blame my teachers mostly. I blame them because, a number of teacher are not committed to the work. The head teachers who have been charged to supervise the teachers are no better themselves in terms of punctuality and regularity. Many of them have derelicted their duties for reasons best known to them and I believe this must stop.

Mr. Chairman, I assure all of you gathered here that, the trend has to be reversed and to give meaning to this, a new vision has been carved and that is 'EMANCIPATION OF THE YOUNG ONES THROUGH EDUCATION'. This means that, henceforth:

- a. Habitual lateness and irregularity will not be accepted
- b. Lazy head teachers will be demoted
- c. Monitoring will not be a past time but a passion
- d. Performance contract signed with circuit supervisors has to be religiously implemented
- e. Performance contract signed with head teachers who in turn have signed same with their teachers will also be made to work
- f. Use of mobile phones by teachers during lessons delivery has been banned
- g. Educational workers who perform creditably will be rewarded accordingly
- h. Drunken teachers when caught will be severely sanctioned
- i. Above all, the Education Directorate has intensified its monitoring activities vigorously

I will on this note urge all players in education to cultivate the habit of encouraging the young ones in school and buttress their strengths rather than talking about their weakness all the time. For now, let us stop talking about teenage pregnancies, truancy and the heaping of insults on the innocent children. Rather, we should talk about what the child can and will do to enhance the realization of their potentials, the benefit of such potentials when harnessed and above all, what the future holds for them.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen, the picture seems not too encouraging. But I wish to say that all is not lost. An NGO, (Smart Kids Foundation) whose remit is education oriented, sponsored JHS Education of three P6 pupils from Apirede Presby, Awukugua SDA and Mamfe Methodist Schools at Joy Standard School in Kumasi. It is heart warming to say that out of 14 pupils who were sponsored nationwide, Akuapem North District alone won three slots on merit. This indeed, is a great achievement. I commend the staffs of the three schools for good work done. Let me once again, pay tribute to all those behind Akuapem Community Foundation for their vision especially, the various reading materials they have so far donated to the schools. The totality of items donated so far are in the appendix, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Chairman, let me appeal to stakeholders to show some dedication to our customers – that is the young ones.

Let us work as a team

Let us learn, change and improve

Let us focus on results

Let us work with integrity so that, we all make Akuapem North better.

If this trend continues, and if students from the Traditional Area would benefit from Governments Scholarships for Science and Maths in Senior High Schools, then Akuapem CF would actually have chalked remarkable success. Students from Akuapem Traditional Area would also benefit from a 30% quota allocation of places for local students within a 10 mile radius from a Senior High School in the area.

We are certain now that Akuapem students will benefit from this new quota system that has been introduced.

And if Akuapem CF has been able to motivate others in improving upon their performance, no other testimony would prove that better than the paper presented at the ceremony by the District Director of Education for Akuapem North District – also attached.

Conclusion

In the short term we have acquired a contact point within the Kemp Library at Aburi Akuapem, which was originally built by UNICEF for FAWE as a community library.

In the medium to long term we aim to construct a second storey on top of that library to use as offices.

There is an adage in Akuapem which says ‘Me betoo me nena (nom), nti minim se...’ Literally, this means ‘I was lucky enough to have met my grandparents (who told me this and that) and therefore I know that.....’

So in the long term we can envisage that an exchange of oral history between various clans and ethnic groups and towns at our community meeting place will help us establish written history (mutually accepted) which will help us perpetuate the Akuapem heritage and hopefully bring peace.

And Beyond Akuapem
